2007-2008 GUILD PROGRAM

September 8, 2007	Morning: Summer wrap-up
	Afternoon: Learning from <i>Japanese Textiles</i> -Laurie Autio The limited range of Japanese clothing styles, compared to Western dress, seems to have lead to far greater creativity in the fabric itself. Garments that on first glance appear to be printed may turn out to be woven in amazing detail, finely stenciled, or hand-painted.A "plain" fabric is often a finely detailed damask. Dappled dots of shibori coalesce to form large graphic designs. Warp and weft resist dyeing combine in intricately detailed pictures. An underlying damask pattern is dyed in a gradation, and a supplemental metallic weft pattern, perhaps highlighted with embroidery or gold leafing highlights and complements the whole. Great thought is given to how the patterns are placed on the flat garments and how they fall on the body. Common themes have endless variations and a subtle symbolic language. This trunk show style talk will look at specific examples of Japanese textiles to examine techniques, styles, and lessons for the inspired western handweaver.
October 13, 2007	Morning: <i>Shadow Weave I</i> -Pam Engberg The first session of the Shadow weave study group will cover the Atwater threading system. We will learn how to convert any twill threading (and several other threading types) to a shadow weave threading. Study group participants will be expected to design a shadow weave pattern from a favorite twill, and weave a sample to show at the next Shadow Weave meeting (11/3)
	Afternoon: Rag Rags-Ute Bargmann and Loris Epps Slide presentation of different types of rag rugs and actual examples woven by Loris Epps and others who are willing to bring their work.
November 3, 2007	Morning – <i>Shadow Weave II</i> -Pam Engberg This session will discuss the Powell threading system for Shadow Weave. Participants may use the same pattern that they converted to the Atwater threading, and see how it would be done in the Powell system. A sample done in Powell will be expected for the third meeting, 2/2.
	It has been said that the Atwater system is easier to design, but the Powell system is easier to thread. See which one you prefer.
	Afternoon: Weaving Books in the Guild Library-
December 1, 2007	Holiday Party and Surprise Project
January 5, 2008	Morning: <i>Deflected Doubleweave</i> -Eunice Smith Deflected Double Weave will give you a chance to weave circles and curves. Eight shafts will have four different two shaft warps to work with. Six shafts will have three. These separate warps will weave warp floats, weft floats or tabby. By changing the tie-up many different versions can be woven on one warp. Wet Finishing does magical things to this weave. What once were straight lines
	become graceful curves. Deflected Double Weave is included in the three dimensional weaves that are so popular now.

2007-2008 GUILD PROGRAM (cont'd)

Afternoon:	Kente Cloth-Loris Epps
	Travel to the continent of Africa and learn about many of the textiles woven and used on the West Coast. This lecture offers a glimpse of strip weaving, embroidered cloth, dyed fabric and plant material, signs and symbols, and other aspects of items used for clothing the body in West Africa. A replica of a loom will be available as well as an extensive handout and bibliography.
February 2, 2008	Morning: <i>Shadow Weave III</i> -Pam Engberg This session will discuss the technical aspects of shadow weave: how the tie-up relates to the shadow weave blocks. We also will look at variations which can be created by varying color combinations, thread types and weights, and sett. The relationship of shadow weave to rep weave will be discussed and an intermediate structure called "shadow rep" introduced.
	Afternoon: <i>Ergonomics for Weavers</i> -Laura Freeman and Reva Greenspan Is weaving a pain in the neck or a pain in the back? Laura & Reva will present Weaving Ergonomics. To help us prepare information most helpful to everyone, please let Laura know which anatomical areas affect you most when performing any tasks related to weaving (e.g., warping, winding, threading, etc.). For example, my neck and shoulders bother me when I am threading the loom.
March 1, 2008	Morning: <i>Rep Weave</i> -Pam Engberg Pam discovered that shadow weave threading result in patterned rep. This session will discuss several aspects of rep weave, including classic rep threading vs. warp-faced weaving, sett variations, and the impact of loom type on weaving rep.
	Afternoon: <i>Transparency Lecture</i> -Ute Bargmann Slide lecture on transparencies in preparation for the April workshop with instructions on how to prepare for the workshop.
April 5, 2008	All Day - <i>Transparency Workshop</i> -Ute Bargmann Weave your own transparency – handout with different techniques will be supplied Agawam Public Library 10 A.M.– 4:00 P.M.

Weavers from Bhutan

In mid-July, an exhibit of Bhutanese textiles opened at the C.X Silver Gallery in Brattleboro. By happenstance, they came in contact with two Bhutanese weavers who were visiting at the time in Arizona. The director of the gallery invited them to come to Vermont to celebrate and illustrate the exhibit going on there. Leki and Rinzin Wangmo, the mother-anddaughter team were actually featured in the spring issue of SS&D. With lots of sawing and discussing, the equipment was set up and Leki, who is a famous and very skilled weaver in her country started setting up. The yarns were not really up to her snuff – judging from the items that she brought, it is mostly three-ply, as it needs to be very strong and very fine. The warp is set extremely close, so close, that you cannot see the pattern wefts interlacing from the back. It was very interesting to watch yet another way to start a

project on a backstrap loom. Some of the elements are much like the backstraps of the Western Hemisphere, but others are very different. It would take too long to explain it here, but, perhaps a guild program could be undertaken, if enough people are interested. The textiles they brought for sale are exquisite. All the patterns seem to be done with the flying fingers of one hand, as the other holds on to the pick-up stick. The beating is extremely hard due to the close sett. It seems that if you do that kind of weaving, you would never have to worry about roundness of the body.



Study Group—Shadow Weave

The Study Group topic for this program year is starting point for this discussion group. Pam has volunteered to serve as the discussion leader at the October morning meeting. The Study Group Coordinator for this project is an open position at this time. Shadow weave is a block weave . The pattern effect is vertical stripes vs horizontal stripes. Pam will lead us on an in-depth study of this block weave, different systems to obtain this effect, and different classification systems.

The study group will be in 4 parts, running from October

and November with the last lesson in March.

A special treat will be the February when Pam will teach us how rep relates to shadow weave.

Members are expected to weave a sample for exchanges in November and February.

GUILD HISTORY

In the spring of 1951, two friends, Carolyn Stannis and Madeleine Aldrich, interested in handweaving wanted to meet others with the same interest, and perhaps start a weavers' guild. Several meetings were held at the YWCA. Summer came and it was decided if people were still interested they could get in touch with either person after Labor Day. Nothing happened until about November, when three stated a desire to proceed. All were notified and a meeting was held on the evening of November 30, 1951, at the home of Miss Madeleine Aldrich. Ten attended and voted to organize the Weavers Guild of Springfield (Mass.) and elected officers.

We continue to grow, demonstrate weaving and spinning, and foster the art of weaving.
