

# WEAVERS GUILD OF SPRINGFIELD

### LEAVING A WARP ON THE LOOM SINCE . . .

Life often gets in the way and best intentions go out of the window and in that scenario many times we will end up leaving a warp on the loom much after we planned for a finished product. Has this ever happened to you? Below are several photos of the warps that was left on the Guild looms for over two years - one was a wool and the narrow white one was a singles linen intended for bookmarks. If you look at the one on the right hand side you can see how many weights were added to tie broken warp ends and guess what -in the end we could not use the warp and were able to weave ten or 12 inches. The single linen fared much better in that we were able to weave at least 12 bookmarks without a broken thread but you can see how dried out and hairy the warp had become. We will have examples of what was produced at the September meeting.

The take away is *Do Not Leave a Warp on a Loom* for an extended period of time. BUT if you must consider the warp content, where the loom will be stored, and make sure that it is not under high tension. The amount of total time spent on the wool warp was not worth the effort and did not present a good example of weaving at the Glasglow Land Scottish Festival. Lesson learned!
